


The second annual "Alice in Wonderland Mad Hatter's Children's Tea Party" will be

We owe enormous thanks to our dedicated volunteers and a big thank-you to all our members and community business partners. And we recognize that we are building on the dedication of all those who have worked for the Society over the years, just as we build the future of our community on the fascinating legacy of the past.


Morgan Hill House Book Nook

For those of you who enjoy a good book, snuggled under a comforter, on a cold, rainy day like the ones we've been having, read on.

Discover Enchantress, Sorceress, Madwoman by Robin C. Johnson, published in 2014 by California Venture Books, 230 pages, \$20.00. This book recounts the life, loves, and trials of Sara Althea Hill, sister of our own Hiram Morgan Hill. After the death of their parents, these siblings, in their 20s, moved to San Francisco from Missouri in 1871. They participated in the active San Francisco social life, with the goal of becoming rich. Diana Murphy was Hiram's ticket to that goal; Sara had to work a little harder! After several romances with wealthy men, Sara at last attracted the attentions of Senator William Sharon. After a fairly short courtship, the Senator and Sara signed a marriage contract, not to be made public for two years - the Senator's request. Then things get really interesting! After the two

years had passed, the Senator, having meanwhile moved on to other romantic interests, denied having signed that contract. Sara sued him for breach of promise, among other things. What followed were eight years of Court battles in State, Federal, and the Supreme Court. The accounts of witnesses' and Sara's testimony are based on Court records and salacious newspaper accounts of the time. Never one to tell the truth if it didn't suit her, Sara had an amazing ability to coerce friends and associates into lying for her case. A few of those "witnesses" had later perjury trials of their own. I won't spoil the ending for you. I will just say, "Be careful what you wish for!" (This would make a spectacular movie script.)

A Visual History of Pacific Congress Springs, Saratoga, by Sanders & Bookman, published in 2016 by San Martin Press, 91 pages, \$29.95. The authors' Preface reads, "Based on postcard images and original photographs, this book traces the history of the Pacific Congress Springs from the time of the discovery of the mineral waters by European settlers in the 1850s to the resort's closure in 1932, and of its more modest neighbor, Azule Mineral Springs". Congress Hall, one of the "premier resorts" on the West Coast, was first built in 1865 near McCartysville, later to be renamed Saratoga. In 1881, after several owners, the Hall was enlarged to 63 rooms, \$2.50/night. There

was a grand ballroom, and a separate children's dining room. Guests could enjoy hunting, fishing, and the "waters". Because these waters contained the same minerals and in the same proportions as those of the famous Congress Springs in Saratoga, NY, McCartysville was renamed Saratoga, and the rest is history. The Hall burned in 1903 and the resort became a daytime park until 1932 when it was closed altogether. The mineral waters continued to be bottled and sold after the fire. The postcards and photos of the time are wonderful and illustrate a wonderful by-gone era.

A Children's Discovery Book about Morgan Hill, California, by Cynthia Miller, 2010, 64 pages, \$11.00. This delightful book, for children 5-12 and their parents, includes activities based on natural scenic areas and activity centers in and around Morgan Hill. Informative and fun, find out about Anderson Lake, Coyote Bike Trail, El Toro, Downtown Farmers' Market, The Grange Hall, the Community and Cultural Center, and the Aquatics Center. You will never again be at a loss for somewhere interesting to take your children, or maybe just yourself! Also included is a list of streets and schools and the people they are named after.

The Mineral Springs of Santa Clara County, by Ian Sanders, published in 2010 by San Martin Press, 149 pages, \$29.95. The author's preface reads, "I would...like to think that the presentation of this visual history of a contradictory time at the turn of the 20th Century - a time of elegance and simplicity, of opulence and hardship - will be of interest to both residents of, and visitors to, the iconic region known the world over as Silicon Valley, California". Resplendent with postcards and photos taken at the time, this book describes the main resorts of Alum Rock Park, Gilroy Hot Springs, Madrone Soda Springs, and Saratoga's Pacific Congress Springs. In these resorts, lodges offered dancing and games in the evenings, hunting and fishing during the day. Open only for daytime activities, these smaller springs offered hunting and fishing: Azule, Banta Spring, New Almaden Vichy Springs, Santa Teresa Spring, and Soda Spring. In addition to bathing in the water, these resorts also bottled their waters for sale. Makes you want to do some exploring around Santa Clara County!

The students then exit the kitchen, don their social attire and enter the house as Lady Diana's guests for tea where they learn the social customs of the day.

Villa Mira Monte Improvements & Projects

Thanks to County and City grant funds, and a heathy dose of Historical funds:

The Hiram Morgan Hill House has a beautiful new roof and the doves that were originally perched on points of each gable have returned.

The chimney chase has been restored as a project during the south wall renovation. Along with new water tight colored glass windows flanking the chimney on the second story.

The wrought iron fencing makes a striking statement to identify the site. Elec-

tronic gates open automatically at dawn (7:00 am) and close at dusk (9:00 pm) to secure the site during hours when Villa Mira Monte is closed. Gates will be closed during private events.

Security cameras have been installed and provide for 24-hour surveillance with video backup to capture any unwanted activity. Oh, the driveway! Thanks to volunteers from SCAPA (South County Pilots Assn.) the drive was finally graded and leveled out with new base rock. MHHS paid for the base rock, and SCAPA donated the manpower.

Expanded parking area thanks to Chris Ghione, Scott Creer and the City of Morgan Hill for grading, rolling and trucking in pavement shavings from Monterey Road to create a great parking surface.

The couple hundred rosebushes have been trimmed and sprayed and we now await the enjoyment of their beautiful blooms coming soon. This spring we will begin improvements to the front lawn areas.

Kathy Napoli is leading a committee including Native American tribe resources to begin planting a native garden this spring. The garden will serve as an educational tool for field trips and once established, offer the ability to demonstrate the harvesting of grasses and herbs, and crafts such as basket weaving.

2019 Projects Coming Up


This summer the Hiram Morgan Hill House veranda floor and pillar bases will be replaced.
