

With 2021 in full swing, the Pandemic and accompanying health regulations have required us all to reassess what to do and how. Our Board of Directors identified two key responsibilities: to preserve the long-term viability of the Historical Society; and to maintain and preserve Villa Mira Monte, the community asset that has been entrusted to our nonprofit organization.

In this issue of our quarterly newsletter we cover a lot of ground, reflecting our work, our goals and our hopes for MHHS in the near future. During the turbulent summer of 2020, our Board was asked to take positions on current events. We revisited our Mission Statement and reaffirmed our commitment to collect, preserve and present the history of our community; not to “make history.” By the fall we had drafted and approved a Position Statement supporting ethnic and social justice (see article).

It was with a heavy heart that the Board and Operating Group said goodbye to Board member Linnie Lee in November. Linnie and Carl have our best wishes in their new home with extended family in Atlanta (see article).

In December we adopted our 2021 Operating Plan, borne out of our October annual planning retreat. I am proud of our Board and Operating Committees for developing the charters, goals and budgets that went into our 2021 Operating Plan, well done team! As we adapt to the pandemic's uncertainties, some elements of our Plan may need modification, but we have a plan and we will adapt as needed. The budget we adopted has a small deficit that we hope to remedy with a fundraiser later this year. Otherwise, we will have to dip into reserves.

The Board is committed to maintaining Villa Mira Monte; the structures, grounds and landscape in the park-like condition that is expected by our community. Although VMM is closed due to the pandemic regulations we are prepared to open as soon as regulations permit. We did open for 5 hours in late October under strict supervision and monitoring to recognize and celebrate Día De Los Muertos (see article).

In December the Membership Committee kicked off the annual membership renewal drive. Thank you, members for your quick and generous responses (see articles “Blessing of Members” and “Skip the Holiday Tea” to get an idea of our member spirit).

We are proud of our filmmaker team for their successful December film screening of *Stories from the Past 2020* which included an interactive Q&A with notable guest speakers from our community (see article).

In this issue, our Director of Volunteers, Margo Hinnenkamp, pays tribute to one of our great volunteers, Madeline Bottari—a wonderful role model, thank you!

Another big thank you to Kathy Devine who maintains the History Museum, helps develop curriculum for our field trips, collects artifacts for displays and catalogues our collection. She also has opportunities for volunteers to get involved (see note below). We celebrate our 50th anniversary in July, stay tuned for more details!

Landmark Plaque Erected


Villa Mira Monte was officially listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1978. This register is the official list of the Nation’s historic places worthy of preservation. Authorized by the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, the National Park Service’s National Register of Historic Places is part of a national program to coordinate and support public and private efforts to identify, evaluate, and protect America’s historic and archeological resources.

There are more than 95,000 properties listed in the National Register and almost every county in the United States has at least one place listed. There are 118 listed properties in Santa Clara County. Morgan Hill has four of them including Villa Mira Monte. The other three are Malaguerra Winery, Poverty Flats Site and Rhoades Ranch.

The Board of Directors of the Morgan Hill Historical Society recently installed the plaque on the beautiful wrought iron fence positioned just to the right of the main walkway entrance to Villa Mira Monte. It celebrates the status of Villa Mira Monte as a local historic treasure for present and future generations and highlights the significance of the Morgan Hill Historical Society’s volunteer-led efforts to preserve this unique historic site.



Dia De Los Muertos Educational Event

On November 2, 2020 the Morgan Hill Historical Society funded through a Santa Clara County Historic Grant Program, presented its first community educational event for Dia De Los Muertos (Day of the Dead). Under the direction of Kat Napoli, the committee created a plan that; accommodated the Covid-19 restrictions and precautions, allowed for scheduled public involvement and safety for all volunteer involvement. Informative materials were created, a demonstration altar was exhibited and area experts were available to talk with visitors.

Some 65 participants within 35 different family groups were able to visit and contribute to one of two community altars. Participants were allowed to bring three items to contribute and leave on the altars. Informative posters described the use of *calaveras* – skeletons, and the significance and meaning of various altar components. In addition to the time spent engaging with the altars and sharing stories related to their departed, the participants could pick up handouts on creating an altar at home, a recipe for “Day of the Dead Bread”, and a take-away skull pattern, to color and decorate at home.

Morgan Hill Historical Society Board of Directors, Adopted on September 23, 2020

Supporting Ethnic and Social Justice

The Morgan Hill Historical Society is committed to standing with the Black community and all people who suffer from social injustice.

In recent months our nation has seen an acceleration of events involving police misconduct and brutality, and racial injustice primarily against people of African American descent. As a nation we witnessed, along with the rest of the world, the unlawful and brutal death of George Floyd by members of the Minneapolis police force.

Our nation is facing a systemic and complex crisis which is endemic in policing policies and practices in many communities in our nation, but beyond this, these injustices have permeated our social justice systems. People of all races are calling for change in the systemic racism which has been a part of the fabric of America's history since the first Europeans landed on our shores centuries ago.

The Morgan Hill Historical Society denounces violence against all people, and we recognize the urgency of this particular situation. To this end we are committed to standing with all people experiencing social injustices. On July 17, 2020 the City of Morgan Hill adopted Resolution 20-039 proclaiming Black Lives Matter and committing to stand in solidarity with its Black Community. The city cannot make these changes without the support of the entire community. In light of this, on August 17, 2020 the Morgan Hill Historical Society adopted Resolution 20-01 committing to a diverse, supportive, inclusive community and to applying this commitment to all of the Society's activities, programs and communications.

Preserving and sharing history through education is the heart of our mission. Understanding the lessons of the past enables us to make better decisions for the future. We want our community to be safe for all people suffering from social inequities and injustices. Without education, training, and inclusion, there will be no reform, there will be no meaningful change.

In support of the Society's mission, it will collaborate in interactive dialogue for peaceful exchanges with other community organizations to create positive recommendations of actions to move our community forward with equity, diversity, and inclusion for all.
